- Cub Scouts is a volunteer-led, family experience.
- We lean on our parents to serve in committees
- Consider serving as a Den Leader and help coordinate regular Den meetings.
- All family members are invited, and encouraged, to participate.





Pack and Den Meetings

Pack meetings

- All of the Dens together (approximately 66 Scouts)
- Meet once a month
 - Share information, present awards
 - Group activity

Den Meetings

- Small groups of 6-12 kids of same age/rank
- Meet 1-2 times per month, depending on leader/parents
 - Rank advancement activities
 - Fun!



Scouting Activities




- You can't spell "Scouting" without "outing"!
 - Campouts
 - Hikes
- Cub Scouting is more than meetings!
 - Engagement and games
- Other activities include:
 - Community service
 - Pinewood Derby
 - Water Bottle Rockets
 - Egg Drop

Scouting Costs



- Additional costs
 - Uniform approx. \$75
 - * We have some gently-used neckerchiefs & slides up for grabs!
 - Campouts ~\$100 for the year (per person camping)
 - 3 X ~\$10, 1 X ~\$70

- Pack Registration: \$100
 - Pack Administration
 - Reserve, equipment maintenance
 - Friends of Scouting donation
 - Advancement Awards
 - Pinewood Derby car
- Pack T-Shirt: \$15
- BSA Registration (Collected Separately):
 - Returning Scout: \$85
 - New Scout: \$105
 - (Optional) Boys' LifeMagazine \$15



Uniforms



- Class A, purchase at Scout Shop
 - Shirt, neckerchief, slide, and belt
 - Patches District, Pack numbers, Den numbers
 - Optional shorts, socks, hats
- Class B, purchased through the Pack
 - Pack T-Shirt



Youth Protection Training

Every parent/guardian who attends Pack or Den events (such as campouts) must complete Youth Protection Training.

Training is online, self-paced and takes about 1.5 hours.

Volunteering

- Parents are the defining source of Scout leadership
- When we share the load, even the busiest parent can get involved
- Parents should participate in and encourage their Scouts in their advancement
- Allows you to teach by example and impact quality time with your child

- If you are going to attend, why not lend a hand – volunteer to assist Den leaders, Pack leaders and other parents.
- The leaders are not here to parent your children – that is still your job.

Assistant Cub Master

- Assist the Cubmaster in executing a quality program
- "Master of ceremonies" of the monthly Pack Meeting
- Provide support to Den Leaders

Assistant Quartermaster

- Store and maintain pack assets (bottle rocket launcher, derby car track, ...)
- Setup and operation of assets

<u>Lion Den Leader</u>

- Plan and run Den meetings enabling cub scouts to reach their rank requirements
- Monthly Den meeting, and Pack Committee meeting

Public Relations Chair


- Trooptrack website and collateral updates

First Campout? What to expect...

Essentials

- Tent (inexpensive, large, family tents are best at this age). Families will tent together.
- Sleeping bag, pad, pillow
- Flashlight, lantern
- Water bottle filled with water at home.
- Sunscreen, toiletries
- Reusable food utensils/plates/cups
- Comfortable walking shoes, hiking boots, or sturdy walking shoes
- Cub Scout uniform and Pack T-Shirt
- Medical form, personal medication

Optional

- Rain gear check weather
- Insect repellent
- Outdoors folding chairs (for campfire)
- Night clothes for sleeping
- Change of clothes

Notes

- Medical forms we cannot give even aspirin without consent
- Youth Protection Training required for all parents/guardians & leaders
- Buddy system scouts should never be alone, we will enforce this.
- Flush toilets, water, sometimes showers
